years. It is racked pretty
near as bad as it was before
it was fixed

I thought when Mac Donald
rented that barn from you
that he was to keep everything
about the place in repair
I did not like to say anything
to him for I did not know
what arrangement he had
with you also the fences
is out of repair. I dont
know the size of the barn
I will measure it on Saturday
and let you know

Dear

I am enclosing you payments to be made for this month. We are getting on well with cutting & piling but cant use the sleighs yet as there is hardly any ice and our country full of small lakes, about 9 inches of snow here, just as soon as we can do any hauling on the sleighs, I intend going down for teams and will take down the list of supplies required for next years operations. We will not need a great deal this year to run 2 camps next year as we will have considerable stock left over from this year. We are getting some of the best logs now that has gone down the Couleuge for years.

Estimate of Pine on Limit No 218
fronting on the Ottawa river

There are about 25 square miles of this
limit with pine on, balance of territory
hardwood & burnt country. The pine is
small and very defective, very few
logs can be cut from the trunk or
body of the tree on account of sprunk
and the greater part of the whole cut
of white pine will ^{be} made ^{up} in
the tops and consequently small
& coarse, the red pine of which there
is $\frac{1}{3}$ is sappy & too small for dimension
timber. The country is rough along
the Ottawa river and the haul to the
Ottawa, Smiths and Antoine creek
should not average more than
 $\frac{1}{4}$ mile. The improvements on

Smiths creek will have to be
built up again and will cost at
least \$14,000⁰⁰ besides considerable ^{repa}
to improvements on Antoine creek
the improvements on Antoine creek belong
to J. R. Booth and no doubt the tolls are ^{\$}
as the slides & dams have cost 10,000⁰⁰

These logs will average 53 feet per log "Dumber Rule" 50% 16 feet long and I have only made an estimate of pine which is fit to cut now or 12 inches on the stump. There is a large quantity of small young pine which is on the stump which I have not counted on

Average haul for logs and pulpwood $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

All the logs and pulpwood on those berths can be handled fairly cheap with the exception of $1\frac{1}{2}$ million feet on north end. There are no creek improvements required. The country is fairly level and easy to log and the distance from North Temiscamingue to the bulk of the pine is about 28 miles going north through the Hawkesbury Lumber Cp's limit and to south end of Long Lake.
